# Call for IT expertise – can you help?

The North Craven Building Preservation Trust and North Craven Heritage Trust are looking for a volunteer willing to become a trustee of both Boards. This is a shared role with a focus on information technology. You will have a good understanding of networked systems and be able to communicate clearly with staff and volunteers, some of whom may not be technically proficient. You will play an important role in helping both organisations to improve their IT infrastructure and will also act as a bridge, bringing the two trusts into closer cooperation. NCBPT trustees meet bi-monthly and NCHT quarterly, but we do not expect you to commit to attending every meeting.

### **Capturing the Past**

'Capturing the Past' is a long-term project led by Friends of the Dales, a registered charity. The project collects and displays historical material relating to the communities and people of the Dales, with the original/current focus on the wider Ingleborough Dales. Community volunteers are supported to catalogue, digitise and upload their own local archive material onto a specially designed website. Here, it can be browsed and searched to show everyone the treasure trove of photos, documents, wills, parish records, deeds, indentures and even spoken

memories that have been collected far.

We already offer access to over 2,700 items of historical material, most of it not previously available to search online. Additional collections will be added as they are processed. At present, there are 29 larger, local archives (plus several smaller ones), on the site.

We also provide links to other, local history websites. These signposts include the **North Craven Heritage Trust** and the **Upper Wharfedale Heritage Group**.

'Capturing the Past' gives those who have a collection of local history material the opportunity to display the objects to a wider audience. Instead of being a collection of photos in cardboard boxes in the attic, it becomes a resource available to the whole world. A family asset can become an asset to be studied by everyone.

If anyone is considering putting their collection onto the 'Capturing the Past' website, there are three stages to the process:

- Cataloguing volunteers are trained/supported to sort and organise their material
- 2. Digitising training and equipment is offered so that the material can be digitised
- Uploading further training/support to upload the collection on the Dales Community Archive website for full public acces

This may seem a daunting process, but the there is help available from the Project Leader: John Cuthbert. He will assist you through all three stages and make sure you have the knowledge, skills and access to specialist digitising equipment you need to complete the task.

Capturing the Past was originally developed through Stories in Stone, a scheme of conservation and community projects concentrated on the Ingleborough area. The scheme was developed by the Ingleborough Dales Landscape Partnership, led by Yorkshire Dales Millennium Trust, and supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

### **Dated Doorheads**

In July 2020, an enjoyable project was started to investigate dated doorheads in the Ancient parish of Giggleswick, comprising Giggleswick, Langeliffe, Rathmell, Settle and Stainforth. A group of four - Jean Asher, Eileen Bamford, Pam Jordan and Mike Slater – has worked together to determine the family names associated with these datestones. The available evidence has been documented. We looked at 91 examples having dates and initials, with ten of these having no initials but worth noting. Surprisingly, the success rate in finding almost certain or near certain names is near 90%.

We needed to consult the Giggleswick parish register (1558-1837), wills (up to 1750), deeds (1704 to 1750) and the Hearth tax list of 1672 – all being of considerable importance. Fortunately, some of this information can now be found online at www.NorthCravenHeritage.org.uk and www.dalescommunityarchives.org.uk. Books on local history have been consulted. The benefits of much effort spent on accumulating such information over the past 20 years or so are shown in this project. We are also grateful to those individuals who have allowed access to private premises to obtain photographs of datestones not previously available.

As a result of this project we consider that datestones were incorporated into buildings most probably when a family could afford to build a new house in stone, or improve or alter an existing property. This often took place some years after marriage. Rarely does a datestone coincide with a marriage date, and most improbably the date of birth of a child. Most of the datestones are in the time period of the great rebuilding of houses in stone, about 1660 to the early 1700s. Then a large time gap appears before another wave of building in the 1800s.

The list will be put on the NCHT website in due course, and when members are notified, a call can be made for help in identifying certain cases, confirming our results, or noting errors of mistaken identity. An article in the Journal can then be considered to present our findings.
