

Granby 16 August 1841

My dear Sir

I have just received yours of the 14<sup>th</sup>  
I think you have done quite right to state  
the precise state of the Littledale Tent boundary  
case to the Commissioners in London. I do not  
think they understand what they are about at all  
& this is the Secretary's opinion also. I think you  
judge correctly about not taking your witness to  
Tent on the 20<sup>th</sup> but your witness must be  
all the examinations taken & your witness must  
each witness each witness is to be sworn & for if it  
shall be determined to proceed before the  
Commissioners little time will be afforded  
after the 20<sup>th</sup> to produce the evidence  
I suppose the Commissioners as soon as they shall <sup>have</sup> concluded  
to proceed will in the first place go on to the ground  
to view the land himself probably attended by some  
individuals of each party & then the cause to be disposed

you & Mr. Watson with the Prop will of course  
attend him as also some of the witnesses to present  
and the different points to which the evidence will  
be made to apply among them on one point I think  
Joseph Harrison should be one & also Robert Standy  
also set up the marks, say allow that you may think  
on reading the evidence most important  
and the individuals appointed on each side to show  
the ground should be allowed to attend if it is left  
for all that like to be present but I don't want to  
then & the comparison completely compared.

Our witnesses will all speak to the boundary being  
to the water level - you will be able on the ground  
to establish that the places named in the boundary  
papers are in the line of marks set up by Standy  
some of the old witnesses may not be able to set on  
to the ground & may not be able to speak to Standy's  
marks but they may be able to prove that they occupy a  
up to the places named in the boundary papers
